Under current law, the existing statutory framework for medical marijuana is repealed six months after the effective date of this amendment which affects how this amendment will be implemented. A new regulatory structure for both medical and nonmedical use of marijuana will be needed. Its design cannot be fully known until the legislature acts; however, regulatory costs will probably be offset by regulatory fees. Other potential costs and savings cannot be predicted. Please bring a Photo I.D. with signature to the Polls. If you do not have a Photo I.D., you will be allowed to vote a provisional ballot. The canvassing board will determine the validity of the ballot pursuant to Florida Statute 101.048(2).

The deadline to request a Vote By Mail Ballot is October 24!

To Vote for a Write-In Candidate in the General Election:

- You must write in the name **and** fill in the oval next to the name, for the write-in vote to count.
- The write-in candidate must be a **QUALIFIED** candidate.
- **Do not** fill in an oval for a write-in candidate and fill in a second oval for another candidate in the same race.
