Want to Vote By Mail?

For your convenience, any registered voter may vote by mail. To request a Vote by Mail ballot, you must provide the information we have on file for you such as your FL ID#, FL DL# or the last 4 digits of your Social Security Number. One request can cover you through the upcoming General Election.

Call the Elections Office at (850) 229-6117.

Requests for vote by mail ballots must be made 12 days prior to Election Day for ballot to be mailed. All vote by mail ballots must be in the Supervisor's Office by 7 p.m. (ET) on Election Day, in order to count.

Signature Update

Any time there is a change in your signature or identifying "mark", you must complete a new registration application & submit it to the Elections Office. If your signature on your voter record and the signature on your vote by mail ballot do not match, your vote by mail ballot will not count.

How To MAKE YOUR VOTE COUNT

Our tabulation system uses an optical scanner to read your ballot.

NO. 1 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ARTICLE IX, SECTION 4 AND ARTICLE XII

Partisan Election of Members of District School

Proposing amendments to the State Constitution to require members of a district school board to be elected in a partisan election rather than a nonpartisan election and to specify that the amendment only applies to elections held on or after the November 2026 general election. However, partisan primary elections may occur before the 2026 general election for purposes of nomination political party candidates to that office for placement on the 2026 general election ballot.

NO. 2 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ARTICLE I. SECTION 28

Right to Fish and Hunt Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution to preserve forever fishing and hunting, including by the use of traditional methods, as a public right and preferred use of traditional methods, as a public right and preferred means of responsibly managing and controlling fish and wildlife. Specifies that the amendment does not limit the authority granted to the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission under Section 9 of Article IV of the State Constitution

NO. 3 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT **ARTICLE X, SECTION 29**

Adult Person Use of Marijuana

Allowing adults 21 years or older to possess, purchase, or use marijuana products and marijuana accessories for non-medical personal consumption by smoking, ingestion, or otherwise; allows Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers, and other state licensed entities, to acquire, cultivate, process, manufacture, sell, and distribute such products and accessories. Applies to Florida law; does not change or immunize violations of federal law. Establishes possession limits for personal use. Allows consistent legislation. Defines terms. Provides effective date

Financial and State Budget Impact Statements
The amendment's financial impact primarily comes from expected sales tax collections. If legal today, sales of non-medical marijuana would be subject to sales tax and would remain so if voters approve this amendment. Based on other states' experiences, expected retail sales of non-medical marijuana would generate at least \$195.6 million annually in state and local sales tax revenues once the retail market is fully operational, although the timing of this occurring is unclear. Under current law, the existing statutory framework for medical marijuana is repealed six months after the effective date of this amendment which affects how this amendment will be implemented. A new regulatory structure for both medical and non-medical use of marijuana will be needed. Its design cannot be fully known until the legislature acts; however, regulatory costs will probably be offset by regulatory fees. Other potential costs and savings cannot be predicted.

NO. 4 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ARTICLE I, NEW SECTION

Amendment to Limit Government Interference with Abortion

No law shall prohibit, penalize, delay, or restrict abortion before viability or when necessary to protect the patient's health, as determined by the patient's healthcare provider. This amendment does not change the Legislature's constitutional authority to require notification to a parent or guardian before a minor has

Financial and State Budget Impact Statements

The proposed amendment would result in significantly abortions and fewer live births per year in da. The increase in abortions could be even greater if the amendment invalidates laws requiring parental consent before minors undergo abortions and those ensuring only licensed physicians perform abortions. There is also uncertainty about whether the amendment will require the state to subsidize abortions with public funds. Litigations to resolve those and other uncertainties will result in additional costs to the state government and state courts that will negatively impact the state budget. An increase in abortions may negatively affect the growth of state and local revenues over time. Because the fiscal impact of increased abortions on state and local revenues and costs cannot be estimated with precision, the total impact of the proposed amendment is indeterminate THE FINANCIAL IMPACT OF THIS

NO. 5 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ARTICLE VII, SECTION 6 AND ARTICLE XII

Annual Adjustments to the Value of Certain

Homestead Exemptions
Proposing an amendment to the State adjustment for inflation to the value of current or future homestead exemptions that apply solely to levies other than school district levies and for which every person who has legal or equitable title to real estate and maintains thereon the permanent residence of the owner, or another person legally or naturally dependent upon the owner is eligible. This amendment takes effect January 1, 2025.

Repeal of Public Campaign Financing Requirement

Proposing the repeal of the provision in the State Constitution which requires public financing for campaigns of candidates for elective statewide office who agree to campaign spending limits.
